Your Invitation to the 2011 Caucus Meeting

The Ontario Libertarian Party will hold its annual caucus meeting on Sunday April 17 (see details below). The caucus meeting is open to all members who were candidates in the 2007 election, as well as members who are considering being a candidate in the 2011 election or are willing to help with the campaign. "Paper candidates" are also welcome. Anyone who is not a member can join at the meeting.

The focus of this year's caucus meeting will be on candidate training and planning for the October 6 election. Those who attend will have the opportunity to learn about campaigning tactics from experienced candidates, get ideas on campaign themes and topics, and learn how the party can assist them in their efforts to represent freedom to the people of Ontario.

Our guest speaker will be Gerry Nicholls, one of the five top political minds in Canada.

We will consider possible themes for the fall campaign, such as

- "Who Owns Your Life?"
- Free Markets, not Monopolies
- "We are None Of The Above!"

We plan to provide a booklet for each attendee with details on election goals and strategies, how to take advantage of the free media coverage, arguing from morality rather than effect, how to answer debate questions, sample reading list, etc.

Leader's Report - by Sam Apelbaum

It is obvious now the international financial crisis will not abate and governments will remain in trouble. Easy ways out are no longer available. For decades, maladies induced by states everywhere have multiplied and grown. They have rarely been squarely faced and continue to be pushed by politicians into the future for someone else to worry about. That is what they have always done to win elections and retain the pleasures of power, but clearly a massive shakeup, long expected in libertarian circles, is imminent and unavoidable. Predictably as well, most people remain baffled by events and continue to look to the state for solutions.



I have no expectation of an overnight conversion whereby libertarianism will become the dominant ideology in Ontario, or Canada for that matter. Change for the better will only arrive when there has been sufficient cultural change. People get rulers who are consistent with the cultural propensities of the societies in which they live. Right now the cultural propensity in Canada is on the side of authoritarianism, with all that implies for our future. As it must be, the more the state has grown, the more respect or concern for individual liberty has diminished, to the point where people hardly understand the meaning of the word "liberty". While the state decrees their incandescent light bulbs illegal and commands them to use a state approved

type, they dimly believe they are free. They believe the state is necessary and indispensable. They respect it, and look to it for care, sustenance and satisfaction of their wants and needs. If the state seems incompetent or fails them, for these people it is simply necessary to replace those in charge to correct matters.



Contrast the above with a culture which does not trust the state, does not like it, does not want anything from it, does not respect it, wants to get rid of it in every possible way as quickly as possible and, having done so, wants to get rid of it some more until ultimately the dangerous, unnecessary and chaotic institution completely disappears. The sooner we experience this sort of thinking in significant numbers, the sooner we will see an end to the obstructions of the state and a concomitant liberation of human potential.

An Ontario election will be held in October this year. It is important to do all we can to promote the libertarian message during this window of opportunity. We have an enthusiastic group of volunteers and big plans. We need your financial support to be able to run a good campaign and support our candidates. The convention of the Libertarian Party of Canada will be held April 30 - May 1st in Vancouver at Columbia College. Jan Narveson:

Distinguished Professor Emeritus (retired) at the University of Waterloo (Ontario), Jan's research interests include Ethical and Political Theory and Applied Ethics. Jan received his Ph.D. from Harvard in 1961. Jan is currently on the Ethics Committee of the Ontario Libertarian Party and is a past member of the board of directors of the Libertarian Party of Canada.

Pierre Lemieux

Pierre holds graduate degrees in economics from the University of Toronto (Canada), and in Philosophy from University of Sherbrooke (Canada). His research interests and fields of publication straddle economic and political theory, public choice, public finance, and public policy.

The Ozone Scare: A Retrospective - By Rod Rojas

Remember when the thinning of the ozone layer was going to cause us all to die of malignant melanoma, just a few years ago? The ozone scare seems to have dropped off the radar entirely.

As you might remember, chlorofluorocarbons (CFCs) were the evil du jour, playing the same role carbon dioxide (CO₂) plays today in the global-warming scare. Environmentalists claimed that CFCs would somehow travel 40 miles up above the surface of the earth, despite the fact that CFCs are about five times heavier than air. A common case of floating bricks, no doubt.

By banning CFCs in 1989, the 196 countries who signed the Montreal Protocol on Substances that Deplete the Ozone Layer lost a cheap, safe, nontoxic, chemically inert, noncorrosive, and nonflammable source of refrigerants, propellants, and fire-control-system components.

As with most regulations, the CFC ban hit the poor with a vengeance. Millions of perfectly functioning refrigerators could no longer be recharged with Freon, so everyone was forced to purchase new CFC-free appliances. This, of course, was especially difficult for those with low incomes.

Another group that still suffers greatly are asthma patients. The substitutes for CFC inhalers are the HFA (hydro-fluoroalkane) inhalers, which many doctors report to be of marginal effectiveness compared to the CFC version, which provided faster and longer-lasting relief from the agony of suffocation. Many patients have found that, whereas one puff used to be sufficient to reopen the airways, the new product requires two or even three puffs to work. This raises the cost of the medication due to the increased dosage. And to add insult to injury, because of their recent introduction, HFA inhalers are protected by patent law, whereas CFC inhalers were already generic. Prices per inhaler have increased from the \$5-\$25 range to the \$30-\$60 range in the United States.

Needless to say, taxpayers are still funding research into this bogus field, and the CFC ban is still alive and well. As always, regulations and funding are very easily put in place — especially when the public is manipulated with scare tactics — but they are very hard to roll back; in fact, regulations are hardly ever repealed, and the institutions in charge of enforcing them are only occasionally dismantled.

It is important to recognize the behavioral pattern of governments, NGOs, and scientists by looking at similar scares, such as acid rain, Y2K, mad-cow disease, H1N1, and now climate change and terrorism. Fear and guilt are the usual tools used to rob citizens of their liberty and money. These scares foster the centralized masterminding of our choices and allow ever-greater transfers of power and wealth toward the government.


Environmental scares are particularly effective because they combine the fear and the guilt effects. Such "man-against-nature" scenarios will provide endless possibilities

for loss of liberty unless power is taken away from governments altogether.

Unless we realize that man and nature are one and the same, there will be no degree of underdevelopment low enough for the ecofanatics: the so-called philosopher poet of the ecological movement, Derrick Jensen, wrote that "civilization is not and can never be sustainable." We should not underestimate this type of statement, especially coming from a man like Jensen, who has a wide audience and has repeatedly defended the use of militant violence to achieve environmental goals. We must be wary, not so much because of the possibility of Jensen's own violent actions, but because of government's talent for harvesting such ideas and using them to its advantage.

Watch for a new scare just as the climate-change myth loses steam and the population grows weary of antiterrorism.

- 2 Audit and most travel expenses are Contributed Goods and Services
- 11 Annual Audit Fee is \$4,000 less Elections Ontario Subsidy which increased in 2009 to \$1488 from \$1344. Audit Fee is shown as an expense (and Accounts Payable) in the current year but not paid until the following year,
- 12 2010 Budget includes \$700 for Manning Conference and \$300 approved for a "Libertarian" banner (Jan 10/10). A booth at the Freedom Fest (May 7) is free if we provide a speaker.
- 13 2010 includes \$161.25 for PayPal (3.63% of \$4,442) and \$225 for VISA (15.5% on \$1,450) 2011 Budget allows for additional contributions for election campaign.
- 14 2011 Budget includes \$500 for 1,400 Bulletins.
- 15 No By-elections expected in 2011. Entire Election Budget will be 'Transfers'. 2010 expenses were for Toronto Centre and Leeds Grenville by-elections.
